RGFB is a distribution center serving over 180 agencies throughout the Valley, such as in church pantries, homeless shelters and soup kitchens. 17,901 different people receive assistance from the agencies in any given week. 53.7% of the households who come here include at least one employed adult, but the annual income level is very low, with most of the help going to young (6-17 years) or old (65 or older) people. How can you help? With food drives and donations, and volunteer service working with food or cleaning, sorting and packing and serving food. Mature young people are welcome.
